

David Patrick Summary

I would like to offer myself for election to the ODNE Board. I am a Swiss-British national and grew up in the UK but have spent most of my life outside the UK, mainly in Switzerland and Germany. I have worked in Switzerland, Germany and Belgium and am fluent in English and German.

I studied Mechanical Engineering at London University (UCL) and Business at IMD in Lausanne, and spent the first 25 years of my working life in Supply Chain and Marketing with large multinationals such as Procter & Gamble and Johnson & Johnson.

During that time I always found the most rewarding and motivating part of my work to be the development of others, and of teams and organizations. I sometimes hired OD consultants and often thought, "wow, that's a cool job – how do they do it"! That's how my interest in OD began and then about 10 years ago, with the support of my friends and family, I made a fundamental long-term decision to change direction. And so, after several years of preparation, I finally took the step about 18 months ago and have since been slowly building my own consulting business.
